# FRIDAY ASSEMBLY & SCHOOL NEWS



Kylian Mbappé is an amazing soccer player, he is so talented. Mbappé has only won one World Cup, but then again, he is only 24.

# NYC SUBWAY by Braeden Awekey-Jiles

The A division/IRT are the number lines and the S train in Manhattan.

Before the first subway in New York, there were four elevated lines in Manhattan called the 2nd Avenue Elevated, the 3rd Avenue Elevated, the 6th Avenue Elevated and the 9th Avenue Elevated in Manhattan. In Queens, there was the Astoria Line and the Queensboro Line. In The Bronx, the 3rd Avenue Elevated continued to Gun Hill Road.

### Manhattan

The Broadway-7th Avenue Line (1, 2 and 3) takes the west side of Manhattan passing through Columbus Circle, Times Square, Penn Station down to South Ferry where the 1 train terminates. The 2 and 3 trains turn east south of Chambers Street to Wall Street. Just below 103 Street station, the 2 and 3 trains head to Lenox Ave.

The Lexington Avenue Line (4, 5 and 6) takes the east side starting from 125 Street on Lexington Avenue to Grand Central where it goes on Park Avenue South heading towards Union Square, City Hall and the financial district. The shuttle goes only from Times Square to Grand Central. The Flushing Line (7) terminates from Hudson Yards and runs along 42 Street.

### The Bronx

The Jerome Avenue Line (4) starts north from the Lexington Line from 138 Street Grand Concourse becoming adjacent to Yankee Stadium. Finally going on Jerome Avenue to Woodlawn.

The White Plains Road line (2 and 5) starts northeast from the Lenox Line from 149 Street Grand Concourse becoming elevated on Westchester Avenue, Southern Boulevard and Boston Road to East 180 Street. Then goes on White Plains Road to 241 Street.

The Dyre Avenue Line (5) starts adjacent to East 180 Street and only goes from East 180 Street to Eastchester-Dyre Avenue. The Pelham Line (6) starts from Third Avenue–138th Street along 138 Street towards Southern Boulevard and Westchester Avenue through Parkchester to Pelham Bay Park.

### **Brooklyn**

The Eastern Parkway Line (2, 3, 4 and 5) start at Borough Hall, down Flatbush to Barclays Center, Grand Army Plaza and on Eastern Parkway to Medgar Evers College to Utica Avenue.

The Nostrand Avenue Line (2 and 5) starts south of the Eastern Parkway Line to Flatbush Avenue Brooklyn Collage. The New Lots Line/Livonia Avenue Line (3) starts east of the Eastern Parkway Line on Livonia Avenue to New Lots Avenue.

### <u>Queens</u>

The Flushing Line (7 local /<7> express) starts in Jarvis Center (since 2015) underneath Times Square, Bryant Park and Grand Central. Then to Queensboro Plaza towards Flushing.

## If Music Be The Food Of Love....

Music is a very interesting subject. There are lots of different sounds and lots of different instruments. I'll be explaining a little bit about music in this article.

First, I'll talk about time signatures. If you see a 4/4-time signature, it means there are 4 quarter notes in each measure. A quarter note is a black circle with a stem. Sometimes you may see time signatures like 3/4, 2/4, and 5/4, 5/4 being the most uncommon. The 3/4-time signature means there are 3 quarter notes in each measure. The 2/4-time signature means there are 5 quarter notes in each measure. There are many other time signatures but we'll just focus on these four.

Now that I've talked about time signatures, let's get into different types of notes. As I said in the first paragraph, a quarter note is a black circle with a stem. There are also half notes, dotted half notes and whole notes. A half note is a hollow circle with a stem. A dotted half note is a hollow circle with a stem and a dot to the right of the circle. A whole note is a hollow circle. A quarter note is 1 beat long. A half note is 2 beats long. A dotted half note is 3 beats long, and a whole note is 4 beats long.

There is one more thing you have to learn...the 12 notes on a keyboard. There are many types of scales, such as C major, A minor, and F major. The easiest scale to learn is the C major scale because it consists of only white keys. The C major scale is: C, D, E, F, G, A, B, C, C, B, A, G, F, E, D, C. There are sharps and flats in some other major scales. If you see a hashtag sign on a piece of music, it is a sharp. It means go a half step higher. If you see a weird-looking b, it is a flat. This sign means go a half step lower. Now that you know this information, you can write a simple piece of music!

# THE RUBIK'S CUBE ... AND HOW TO SOLVE IT!

#### 10 Facts About the Rubik's Cube

- 1: The Rubik's cube was invented by Ernő Rubik in 1980.
- 2: This famous puzzle was originally named "the magic cube".
- 3: There are over 43 quintillion (43,252,003,274,489,856,000) different combinations for one Rubik's cube!
- 4: The first 4x4s and 5x5s were invented in the 1980s.
- 5: The world record for solving a Rubik's cube is 3.47 seconds!
- 6: Rubik's cubes used to have stickers, but now they usually have tiles.
- 7: It took one month for the inventor of the Rubik's cube to actually solve
- 8: A Rubik's cube is made up of 6 centers, 8 corners, 12 edges, and 1 core
- 9: The 6x6 was not invented until the early 2000s.
- 10: A 2x2 can be scrambled 3,674,160 different ways!

#### Rubik's Cube Vocabulary Used in the Text

Method: A way of solving a Rubik's cube

Algorithm: A sequence of moves to achieve a goal

Speedcuber: A person who can solve a Rubik's cube very quickly Block building: Making solved squares or rectangles around the cube

CMLL: Corners of last layer EO: Edge orientation LSE: Last six edges

Move: A continuous turn around the cube EO-line: 2 Cross edges that make a line

F2L: First two layers

#### The Three Big Methods

There are a lot of methods used to solve the cube, but there are 3 that are the most popular. Their names are CFOP, Roux, and ZZ.

#### The CFOP Method

The first one is called CFOP. This method was invented by Jessica Fridrich in 1981. In case you're wondering, CFOP stands for cross, first 2 layers, orientation of last layer, and permutation of last layer. CFOP is a great method because there are 78 algorithms for all 78 cases. Therefore, you will not repeat the same algorithm twice.

#### The Roux Method

The second one is called Roux, invented in the year 2003. It was named after the inventor of the method, Gilles Roux. The steps of Roux are: first 1x2x3 block, second 1x2x3 block, CMLL, EO, and LSE. Roux is a fabulous method because it has an extremely low move count. Solving a Rubik's cube using the Roux method takes around 45 to 50 moves!

### The ZZ Method

The final method is ZZ, invented by **Z**bigniew **Z**borowski in the year 2006. The steps to this method are: EO,EO-line,block building F2L, and LL. Most speedcubers say CFOP is better than ZZ. However, it's still useful to learn this method because it contains EO and block building. These are very important skills to learn if you want to be an advanced cuber.

# The Subway by Braeden Awekey-Jiles

The NYC subway system has grown rapidly from the first subway line to all the different subway lines we have today. The subway system has 27 lines covering 245 miles with 472 stations, the most in the world, but it wasn't always like that.

Before the first subway line, there used to be two elevated train companies, the first one was the MRC (Manhattan Railway Company opened in 1868) and the BMT (Brooklyn Manhattan Transit opened 1885). Once the subway opened, the MRC changed it's name to the IRT (Interborough Rapid Transit) in 1904. In 1932, the IND (Independent Subway System) opened. In 1967, the 3 transit systems came together and created one transit system with new colors. In 1979, the New York City Transit was created with colors representing each trunk, Example: the (A), (C) and (E) trains are blue on the map. That represents the 8th Avenue Line. The (N), (Q), (R) and (W) trains are yellow on the map, which represents the Broadway Line and so on.

There are so many expansions happening for the subway. The most recent one was the Second Ave Subway phase 1, where the (Q) train extended to 96 St. on Second Ave. Phase 2 is when the (Q) train will expand to 125 St. on Lexington Ave with the 4, 5 and 6 trains. Phases 3 and 4 introduce the (T) train that will go to Lower Manhattan at Hanover Square.

I would love to talk more about the subway, but I will leave it there. Stay tuned next time to learn more about the IRT (also known as the A division).

New York City is a special place in winter and there are so many fun winter and holiday themed attractions.








# Penguins by Danie Audry and Sofia Ortiz

Penguins can't fly, but they sure can swim, penguins' flippers help them swiftly glide through the water. Penguins are speedy underwater and are deep-sea divers. When a penguin dives into the water, it can reach a speed of four to seven miles an hour. Emperor Penguins can dive to depths of 1850 feet and stay under for more than 20 minutes. Most penguins spend half of their lives on land and the other half in the sea.

Most penguins pass away after 15-20 years. Between the time of hatching and the growth of its waterproof feathers, a chick depends on its parents for survival, before it can survive on its own. Penguins eat krill, fish, and squid. Penguins need to watch out for leopard seals, fur seals, sea lions, sharks, and killer whales. There are 17 different species of penguins, such as: Adelie Penguin. Gentoo Penguin, Chinstrap Penguin and Emperor Penguins. All penguins live in the Southern Hemisphere, mainly in the frigid tundra of Antarctica and sub-Antarctic islands. They survive in cold climates, thanks to their thick feathers and blubber under their skin.

### **WAKING UP TO SPRING**

Hedgehogs are small mammals, easily recognized by their spines, they hibernate during winter and awake in spring. Hedgehogs wake after hibernation with such drastic weight loss, they initially wake very disoriented and weak. They appear sleepy because they are very wobbly on their feet. Their body temperature drops from 35 degrees to less than 10. Their breathing slows to the point that a hibernating hedgehog, may only take a few breaths once an hour. Brain activity pretty much shuts down, apart from one small area of the autonomic-nervous-system, which stays alert to monitor vital signs and potential threats. Hedgehogs are primarily omnivores. They eat a diet that comprises small snakes, insects, mice, slugs, snails, worms, and frogs. In addition to consuming proteins obtained from meat, they also eat plant materials.

In the wild, hedgehogs can be found naturally in Europe, Africa, Asia, and by introduction in New Zealand. European hedgehogs thrive in grasslands, woodlands, and meadows. You might think that if you are going to have a hedgehog as a pet, you should get another to keep him company. But this is not recommended, as Hedgehogs are solitary animals, in the wild they live alone. This animal cannot always be kept in a cage. Although the cage will be its main habitat, it must be taken out every so often to walk around the house, they do not make good pets for children. The lifespan of hedgehogs is 2-5 years, and the average litter size is 5 hoglets.




### **CLEARSIGHT AND SILKWINGS**

### Interview with Madame DeVault by Cash Kennedy & Jasmine Strong

### 1. What does Jacaranda mean to you?

It's an opportunity for me to care for other people and make a real difference by helping the Jacaranda orphans find their way out of poverty.

#### 2. How is ARS helping the school?

ARS is helping The Jacaranda School for Orphans by raising awareness and funds for the school, in order to help them purchase much needed medical, housing, and educational supplies. With the help of ARS, Jacaranda students are clothed, housed, fed, receive a free primary and secondary education, are graduating and going to college on full scholarships, are learning a vocation so they can work and are building bright futures.

### 3. What were some challenges that Jacaranda had to overcome?

The school began in a four-room house, in a small town in Malawi, Africa. Fifty children sat on the floor without desks, learning from student teachers while the founder, Marie Da Silva, worked as a nanny in the U.S. spending a third of her monthly salary to keep the school running.

#### 4. What do you provide for Jacaranda?

I work with other adults who are dedicated to the school. Because I am an educator, I can help the school with professional development workshops. The teachers at Jacaranda do not have access to the same ongoing teacher training we have in the U.S. I am happy to provide this service to help the teachers who in turn help the students. I speak regularly with Marie and her husband Luc the director of the school, in order to be aware of their current needs.

### 5. How did Jacaranda start?

Jacaranda started when Marie lost many of her family members to a pandemic and children in the town where she grew up, were left without anyone to care for them. She not only opened the school to her family members but other children in the village who needed help too.

### 6. When did you start helping Jacaranda?

### BY FIFTH GRADE


