At the outset, I emphasized the importance of embracing change as a means to realign with our mission and strengthen our core. We focused on empowering our teams, fostering collaboration, and establishing systems that support sustainable growth. Operationally, we've made strides in reorganizing departments, implementing a new financial system, and enhancing employee benefits. These changes underscore our commitment to our staff and the overall health of our institution.

We capped the year by welcoming Eric Saibel as our new permanent Head of School and celebrating the legacy of Shaharazad Hamidi, whose dedication has set the stage for this transformative period.

As we approach our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary, I am immensely grateful for the trust and collaboration of our faculty, staff, board, and families. Their belief in the transformative power of education continues to inspire and drive us forward. This has truly been a year of progress and preparation, setting the foundation for a promising future at The Spring Hill School.

# Preschool Campus Highlights



This year, the [Kindergarten Bridge](#) experience brought all of Spring Hill's kindergarten-age students together for connection and exploration. This cohort will comprise our 1<sup>st</sup> grade class in the 2025-2026 school year.

Third year Montessori Kinder students and Lower Elementary Kindergartners enjoyed hiking and a chance to thoughtfully observe Helen Putnam Park's seasonal changes. They also shared 6 weeks of collaborative music workshops to learn about different genres of music and to try their hand at playing instruments.



At the "trashion-fashion" show, Sparrows students demonstrated imaginative, ready-to-wear creations built from recycled materials.



Led by parent and high school educator Allison Oropallo, a [Preschool Playground Project](#) connected Terra Linda High School students to The Spring Hill School. Teen builders took on the project of creating a new playhouse to be enjoyed by the 40 students in our 3 toddler classes, Pufflings, Ducklings, and Cygnets. The ribbon cutting ceremony was a weaving of multi-generational joy!

In one of our Primary classes, Hummingbirds, new teacher Karen Payne initiated a [garden transformation project](#). Families came each month to build community and clear a piece of land, creating a new outdoor learning sanctuary for the children to discover. The students, families, and teacher created a pollinator garden, built birdhouses, and developed a weather station.

One of the many International Peace Day activities included the opportunity for buddies to decorate Peace Rocks that were used to create a whole campus “Peace River.”


Lower Elementary students connected with Main Campus peers through our first Gratitude Buddy Brunch.

# Global Learning & Service

Spring Hill students practice globally engaged citizenship and contribute to local change right where we live.



## Highlights:

- Kindergarten – 2<sup>nd</sup> graders wrote caring cards to individuals living at Muir Woods Memory Care.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> – 4<sup>th</sup> graders helped socialize service puppies through Stage Gulch Golden's Puppy Volunteer Experience.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> graders made cards with their Buddies for the Petaluma People Services Meals on Wheels Valentine's Day effort.
- They also led a Sock Drive for Petaluma People Services in support of Petaluma's unsheltered community.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup> graders sold handmade bracelets at the Farmers Market for Heart for Humanity USA, to purchase classroom supplies and support Heart for Humanity's upcoming trip to central Transylvania.
- 6<sup>th</sup> graders took on a challenge from Sustainable Petaluma to imagine how we can improve and redesign parts of our town to be more walkable, environmentally friendly, and future forward.
- 7<sup>th</sup> graders volunteered at Redwood Empire Food Bank.
- Our K – 8 "Read-A-Thon" raised funds for Heifer International.
- The campus also participated in the 1,000 Bowls Fundraiser for Petaluma People Services.



# Connections through STEM ✈️

STEM was a major focus this year; our K-8 STEM teachers collaborated on a grant proposal to the Petaluma Educational Foundation. The \$30,000 award helped refresh, expand, and vertically align our STEM curriculum across all divisions, with a particular focus on introducing foundational engineering skills.

Our annual 3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade STEM Week brought these efforts to life, as students engaged in hands-on, inquiry-based learning around the shared theme of glider flight, aligned to Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). After a field trip to the Hiller Aviation Museum, students worked in multi-age teams to design, test, and refine gliders using the design thinking process, culminating in a school-wide launch event.




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# Introducing... The Graduates of 2025


