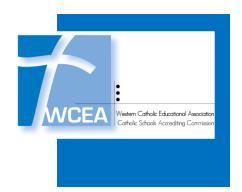

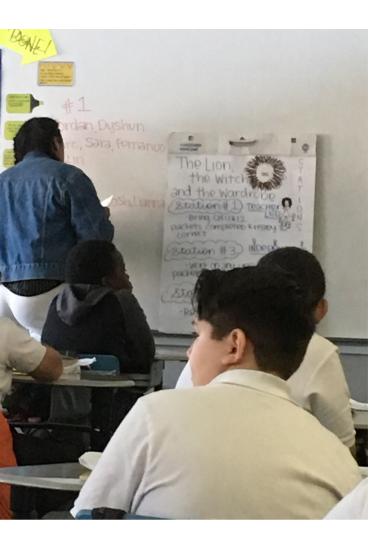

- efforts to strengthen Catholic identity have resulted in high rates of satisfaction



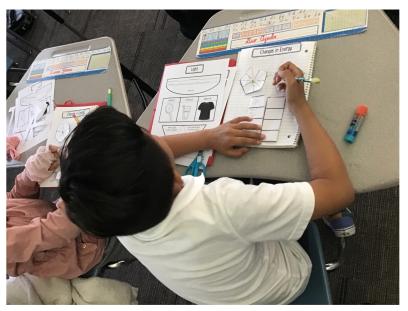
<u>Accreditation Factor #4:</u> *Defined school purpose*

parent surveys indicates a high level of satisfaction with the Catholic identity of the school

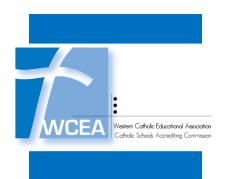
surveys state religious instruction as either effective or highly effective

differentiation in the classroom supports all levels of learners

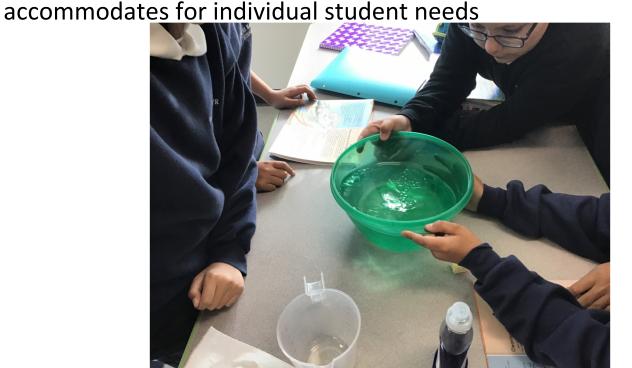




Accreditation Factor #7: SLEs and curriculum

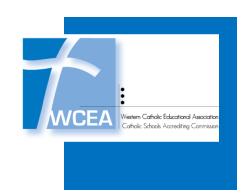

Visiting Committee Summary Thoughts:

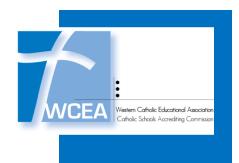


The Visiting Committee observed that Saint Peter Martyr School is a highly functioning school with the following strengths:
